The first Public Information Meeting for the US 278 Corridor Improvements project was held on Thursday, September 27, 2018 from 6-8 p.m. at the Hilton Head Island High School cafeteria. The public comment period closed on October 12, 2018.

Demographics

The general public was invited and encouraged to attend. A total of 203 people attended the first public information meeting. Attendees were very diverse in terms of age, gender and race/ethnicity.

Demographics were tracked by: female (African American, Caucasian, and other minority) and male (African American and other minority). Below are the counts of these groups:


Female: African American – 32

Female: Caucasian – 59

• Female: Other minority – 5

Male: African American – 22

Male: Other minority – 6



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By and large, those in the "Other Minority" category were Hispanic. Many Hispanic attendees took the Spanish-language flyer and left although they were told a translator was available.

According to the <u>US Census Bureau Quick Facts</u>, Hilton Head Island is 77.2% Caucasian (not including Hispanic), 14.1% Hispanic/Latino, and 7.1% African American.

Layout

Content and engagement activities were designed to educate the public about the plan process and to receive information from the public. The room was setup with a sign-in table, seven educational stations, and a table for Beaufort County. The stations were:

- 1. Sign-In
- 2. NEPA Process/Project Schedule
- 3. Study Area Roll Plots
- 4. Traffic Information
- 5. Bridge Needs (Smartboard)
- 6. Environmental Base Map/Community ID Mapping (Smartboard)
- 7. Noise (monitor)
- 8. Comments


Comments

A total of 102 comments were received during the comment period which ended on October 12, 2018. These include:

- Fifty-three (53) written responses at the meeting
- Seventeen (17) website comments
- Thirteen (13) mailed responses
- Sixteen (16) emails (to both Craig Winn and the project email address)
- Three (3) Letters from the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Coastal Conservation League and the Savannah Riverkeeper.

General sentiments on the comments cards can be broken down as follow:

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


Key recurring themes include support for adding bike and/or pedestrian access on and leading up to the bridges connecting Hilton Head Island to Bluffton as well as the need to preserve the Gullah communities. The need for an additional, alternative access point to the island such as a parallel or alternate bridge was also mentioned various times.

Note: Totals should not equal 102 as one response could contain multiple suggestions. Some comments had suggestions outside of these, but categories were based on recurring themes.

These tallies are to be considered general sentiments only. Counts were applied if the respondent specifically cited a particular suggestion. For example, many respondents interested in preserving the Gullah heritage are likely opposed to widening but did not specifically state it. Therefore, they were only counted in the "Preserving Gullah Heritage" category.

Most comments (83%) came from residents of Hilton Head Island and were likely a representative mix of the Public Information Meeting attendees overall.

PURPOSE OF THIS PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) welcome you to this evening's public information meeting and appreciate your attendance here tonight.

The purpose of this public information meeting is to introduce the project to the community, gather initial comments from the public, identify the needs for the project, and help identify concerns about the improvements or impacts to the natural and human environment.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROJECT

SCDOT is proposing to make improvements to the US 278 corridor between Bluffton and Hilton Head Island. The project includes studying the US 278 Corridor from Moss Creek Drive to Squire Pope Road to increase capacity, which will have secondary improvements to overall mobility, congestion, and safety. The eastbound Mackay Creek Bridge, which crosses the Intercoastal Waterway, is structurally deficient and is scheduled to be replaced. Access to Pinckney Island National Wildlife Refuge and the C.C. Haigh, Jr. boat ramp would be improved as well.

SCDOT will move this important project forward through the planning phase with an environmental assessment (EA), with the eventual goal of acquiring right-of-way and construction of the identified improvements. In association with FHWA and Beaufort County, SCDOT will develop the EA, a process that will include reviewing alternatives and comparing the beneficial and negative impacts on the natural and human environment. Efforts will be focused on community involvement and communication to ensure successful development of the environmental process. Due to the major roles state and federal resource agencies play, the project team will work closely with them in completing the environmental review process.



The project is to be funded using federal, state, and local funds. Rightof-way acquisition for this project is tentatively scheduled to begin in 2021.



THE NEPA PROCESS US 278 CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENTS




Ten Steps of the NEPA Process






